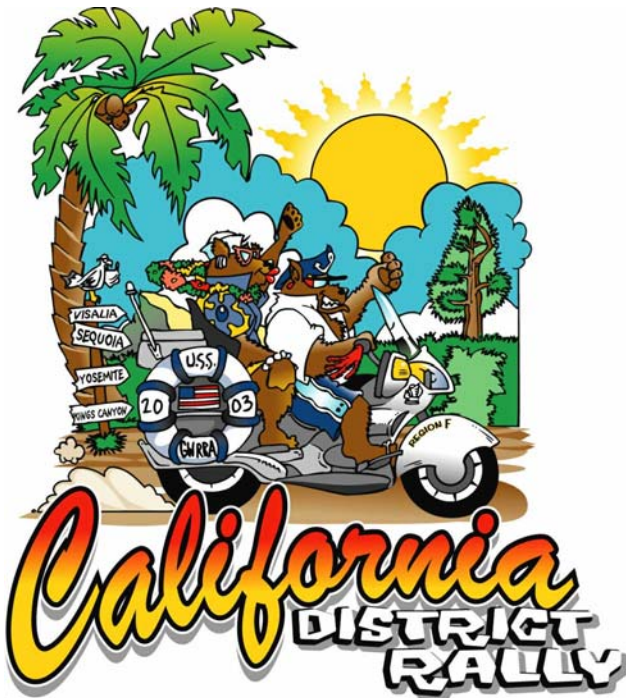

As you all are aware, this month we conducted the Memorial Day ride to Klamath Falls, OR. First, I wish to thank all those who participated in the organization of the ride, and a special thanks to all who ventured out with this motley crew. In all, we had 11 bikes participate.

Bob Tobin did a superb job of arranging activities to keep us all amused and enlightened, especially when one considers he was out of the country for a major portion of the time prior to the ride. First, Mr. Hole decided very early on Sunday morning to head for the local hospital to check out the resident doctor's ability to clear fluid from his lungs. When we were advised of Bob's plight, there was no shortage of folk willing to forego the ride on Sunday to accompany and console Sue during her time of need. Even our new friends from the old Klamath chapter of GWRRA offered to house Bob's bike in their garage until he is capable of making his way back there to pick it up.

As Monday dawned some riders needed to head home in a more direct path. They departed earlier than the rest and arrived home safely without incident. The main body of the participants assembled at 8:00am to "activate Bob" and headed west for state Route 66. This is a fairly twisty road between Klamath Falls and Ashland with some hazards and excellent scenery. This proved to be a lesson in why I feel we are so blessed to have the members that we have in our chapter. About halfway through Route 66, the rider in front of Kay and I (tail gunning because of the trailer) hit loose gravel on the apex of a right hand corner, causing inability to negotiate the next and immediate left hand corner. As we all know, the next stop is an abrupt and horizontal one. The call was immediately transmitted that we had a bike down and what happened next was pure beauty. Within seconds, Kay was off the bike and running back to assist, all bikes turned around and the rider and his passenger received immediate medical assistance, while others protected the scene from oncoming traffic. We in CA2Q are very fortunate to have Mark Kratz, Gary Cooper and Bob Spur as members. The first two are Fremont Police Officers and Bob is recently retired from the Alameda County Fire Department. These guys ever so naturally assumed the task of delivering assistance to both the passenger and rider. Once it was established that the passenger was uninjured, they proceeded to examine the rider, and deliver the necessary first aid. Mark and Gary along with some handy members on the

ride then reassembled the downed bike and Mark test rode the machine, giving both parties a clean bill of health.

As luck would have it, the ride proceeded smoothly until north of Sacramento where the same rider was showing signs of distress from heat and possibly some effects from the fall. Again all members were calm and understanding as the afore mentioned members calmly and effectively put their knowledge to work and the rider was again capable of returning to the road and head for home.

Since these types of incidents are going to happen, a number of things come to mind. We are fortunate to have such valuable members within the chapter and riding with us as a group. We all have the opportunity to take the CPR and First Aid courses at region and district events and I know a lot of the members have already done so. I stress that all of us should take these classes at their first opportunity. As these wonderful folk were assisting, all the other riders were doing what ever was necessary, and displaying the true meaning of the GWRRA motto of “friends for fun, safety and knowledge”.

As the Chapter Director, I would like to express that the professional and caring attitude that was exhibited during all of these incidences makes one extremely proud to say, I BELONG TO CA2Q!

In a nutshell, even with all the incidents, the ride was superb, the scenery beautiful, the weather wonderful (even riding in temps in excess of 100 degrees), and everybody has expressed the same statement of enjoyment.

Thanks again to each and every one of you, I am proud to call you all friends.

Keeping Cool Hot Weather Riding Tips

Well, its that time of year when ride opportunities abound. You will traverse a variety of interesting terrain, weather will be mostly clear, with sunshiny days. Unfortunately, with the sun comes the heat. Riding in temperatures in excess of 90 degrees can be dangerous to your health. It's hard to enjoy your ride or destination, when your head is throbbing and aching from becoming over heated. Unless you take care to keep your body temperature under control, even rides as short as an hour, can result in heat exhaustion or even sunstroke.

Many riders know that if you keep your neck cool, because the large veins that feed your brain are so close to the surface, you greatly diminish these health risks. There are some very popular devices that are simple and effective in this regard.

One is called a "Cool collar" or "Cool Off Tie" and is made from a tube of bandana material or cotton, that contain some water absorbing beads sewn into it. The beads increase in size about 50 TIMES over when they are dry. Thus, when dry, these collars store easily and take up very little room. But getting them wet is not as easy as it sounds. That is, you have to take a dry collar and submerge it in water for up to 1 hour before it has absorbed all the water it can. That hour is often not available to you when you need it. The reason the collar works to cool you off is that it takes even longer for the beads to dry out than it did to get them wet. Airflow over the collar causes evaporation and thus will help keep you cooler.

Another original design is sometimes called "Kool Kollars" or Kool Ties". These are usually made of terrycloth sewn together in such a way as to contain a pocket into which a zip-lock bag is placed. These are filled with ice! This type of collar REALLY cools your neck as the ice melts, and they drip cool water! That dripping leaves the front and back of your shirt sopping wet over time which provides a huge source of evaporation and helps to keep you COOL! At every pit stop you make you can refill the "Kollar" with ice (just pour in a glass of ice water, ice and all).

Note: The bead filled collar cannot be rapidly cooled again once it has gotten warm. Thus, you usually find that people that use them have two, one of which is always sitting in an ice-chest.

Another way to beat the heat, those of you that wear helmet liners can simply saturate them with water before putting them on. This works very well indeed, for about half an hour. Don't forget to open your helmet vents too!

A poor mans technique is to simply pour water on your shirt. This helps a great deal, because it provides a huge area over which evaporation takes place but last for only about a half hour. You may have some overflow onto the front of your pants, which may shock people you encounter when you stop to get gas.

Nowadays, there are many products such as protective riding gear, which can also help keep you cooler. One of which I am familiar is the Joe Rocket brand, Phoenix jacket and pants. It is basically a jacket of tightly woven mesh material, fitted with rock-tex overlay material on the stress areas, elbows. etc. The jacket and pants have high density, foam armor plating, protecting your vulnerable areas. The jacket and pants allow air to flow though, cooling your

larger body surfaces. You can wear shorts underneath your pants and let your legs get some free flowing air too. I usually wear a cotton t-shirt underneath my jacket, which I can soak when I get really hot for accelerated cooling. I like this type of gear, as I can derive the benefits of cooling off and still remain protected. I always carry warm and cold weather riding gear whenever I ride. If you are space limited, you can get a zip out liner or use the liner from another jacket in case chilly weather is encountered.

Layering your clothing is another technique and is proven, as the desert nomads have known for years. We may view these desert dwellers as crazy but layering their clothes, allows them to live in temperatures in excess of 120 degrees. Layering by using cotton undergarments, with loosely fitting cotton outer garments, allow air to flow over your saturated undergarments and promote natural evaporative cooling. Avoid tight fitting clothes, as they transfer direct heat to the skin and do not allow for cooling air to flow over your skin. Wear light colored clothing, which will absorb less heat. Ever sit on your black seat after your machine has been sitting in the sun for a while?

Some riders will strip down, leaving their skin exposed to the direct sun. You may feel you are cooling yourself down but the direct heat from the sun will actually cause you to heat up more. Sweat, a natural reaction of your body to keep itself cool is thwarted, as the evaporation process is speeded up and becomes less effective. Thus, you will require a higher intake of fluids over the long haul.

Seat covers, such as sheepskin or fabric types, help to keep your "Bum" from sweating and again provide a layer of air to promote natural cooling.

Another untested idea is using a personal cooler or mister. You fill the container with water, pressurize the container with the hand pump and place the misting nozzle near your neck. There is a valve that you can use to adjust the spray and a clip to strategically place the nozzle and there you go. The fine mist will provide a constant flow of cooling relief, as air pushes the cooled air over your skin. This will last for up to several hours, depending on how you have it set.

Above all, you must keep hydrated by frequently ingesting fluids. Sodas do not work and can actually act as diuretics, making things worse. Fluid replacement drinks are good but nothing is as reliable as cool, clear water. If you become thirsty, you are already in a state of dehydration. Thirst is a symptom of dehydration and keeping properly hydrated, will help you from becoming thirsty. An average adult can require up to 3 gallons of water, during an extremely hot day.

Anyway, consider and anticipate your needs and heed this sound advice. Doing so may keep you from sacrificing your health and what should be an enjoyable ride. You may find other personal cooling devices and gear by surfing the Internet. If you find something interesting, please share the information with your fellow wingers. I am willing to try anything new, short of putting ice cubes in my BVD's.

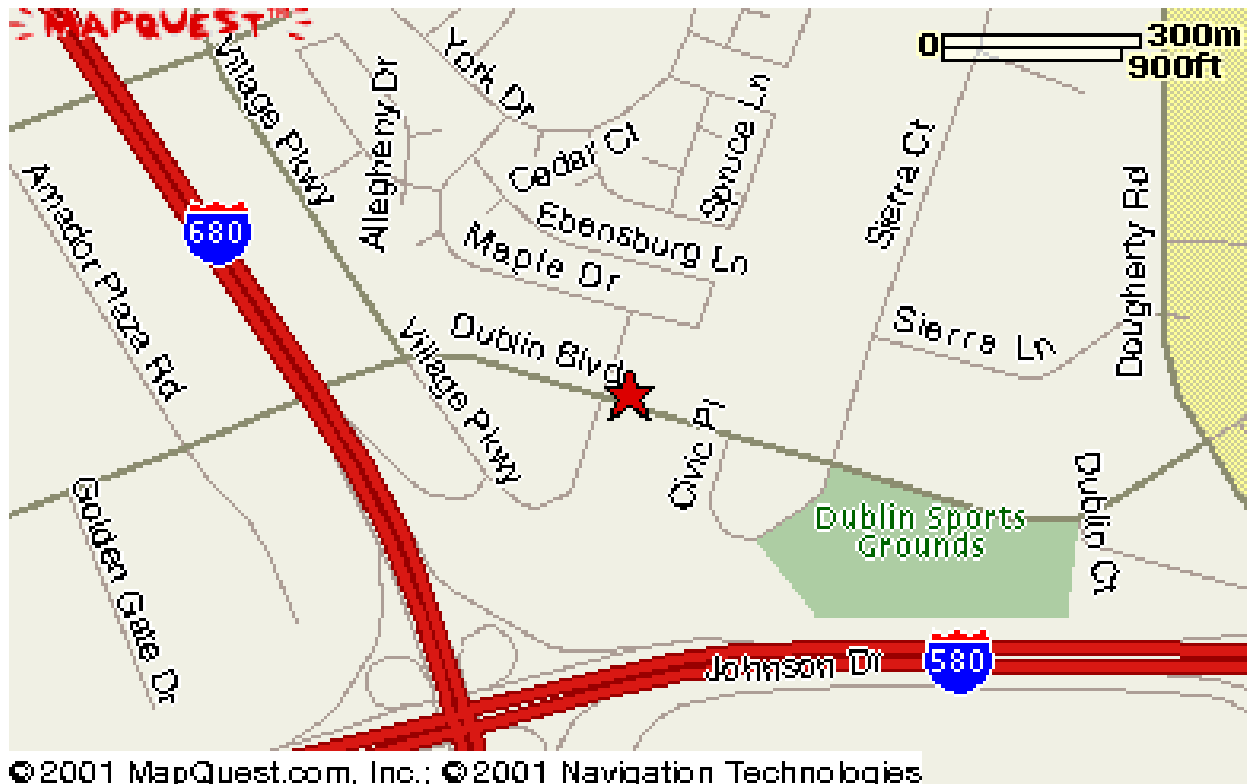

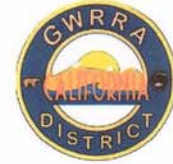
